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About Dan Y Coed

Dan y Coed is an independent special school situated in the West Cross area of Swansea. The school opened in November 2017 and is part of the Orbis Education and Care group.

The school is in a large detached property with easy access to the Mumbles coastline and the city of Swansea. The school has undergone significant building work to extend the school buildings. This work includes the development of residential provision, which is now complete and registered to provide a twenty-bed, 52-week provision.

The school is registered to admit up to thirty pupils aged 5-19 with autistic spectrum disorder (ASD). Currently, there are fifteen pupils attending the school of which eleven are day placements and four reside in the on-site residential provision. All pupils have a statement of special educational needs or Education Health Care Plan (ECHP) and English as their first language. A few pupils have looked after status. Pupils are placed at the school from local authorities in Wales and England.

The head of education has been in post since September 2017. This is the school's first annual monitoring visit.

Main findings

Strengths

Nearly all pupils make strong progress in their ability to participate in learning activities and engagement with others. This is seen through improved pupil attendance, and a reduction in incidents of challenging behaviours.

All pupils benefit from the robust collaborative working relationships between school staff, care home staff, and the on-site clinical team. As a result, staff have a clear understanding of the needs of each pupil and provide effective strategies to meet these needs.

The headteacher provides strong leadership across the school. Leadership has been strengthened by the addition of two senior teachers who each have clearly defined roles and responsibilities. They are beginning to influence the work of the school specifically in assessment and curriculum and pupil voice and wellbeing.

As the school has increased in pupil numbers, additional staff have been employed. A robust staff induction programme fully supports the transition of staff into the school, minimising the impact of change for the pupils.

The school meets all of the Independent School Standards (Wales) Regualtions 2003 inspected during this visit.

Areas for development

Staff at the school have reviewed the curriculum model and as a result, are implementing a new approach to meet the diverse range of needs and abilities of the pupils. However, it is too early to evaluate the impact of this currently.

The school has recently changed the pupil tracking system to reflect the changes in the curriculum model. The new tracking system is rolling out across the school. However, it is too early to evaluate the impact of this currently.

Recommendations

The school should:

R1. Evaluate the impact of the curriculum model

R2. Evaluate the impact of the pupil tracking system
